PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Warm summer greetings are extended to everyone on behalf of the Board and Staff of UCC-SPC. A very special birthday greeting is extended to UCC-SPC's first President, B.L. Korchinski who, in 2005, is celebrating his centenary along with that of the province of Saskatchewan. *Многая літа!*

Last year's Annual General Meeting, which included the election of officers, saw the re-election of most of the executive to another three-year term. It was held in

conjunction with the UCC-SPC Saskatchewan Ukrainian Historical Society's "In Baba's Trunk" conference. The excitement and enthusiasm of "In Baba's Trunk" was a fitting environment to inspire the new board of directors. Indeed the Board of Directors did, and do contribute with generosity and integrity. The full involvement is listed elsewhere in the activities of UCC-SPC. The level of participation continues to demonstrate UCC-SPC's vibrant and energetic cultural impact throughout the province. Special acknowledgement is due the UCC Branches. The Branches are a significant and integral component of UCC-SPC and the Ukrainian presence in Saskatchewan.

The Youth Action Now (YAN) project coordinated with MCoS and funded by the federal government's Department of Canadian Heritage continued to consume a significant amount of the office staff's time. At this point the community is anxiously awaiting the release of the "Blueprint for Action," the project's final report, which will contain many recommendations based on the input of over two thousand youth participants from across Saskatchewan. The Board and the entire community are indebted to Executive Director Danylo Puderak for his vision, leadership and supervisory commitment to the young people's project.

UCC-SPC's commitment to the country of our fore-parents was brought front and centre this past year. Ukraine's Presidential elections were anticipated to be questionable, but who could have guessed the extent to which Ukrainians cherished democracy. The outpouring of support from the Ukrainian community was commendable, and visible around the world. UCC-SPC was proud of the volunteers from Saskatchewan who gave up some of their festive season to assuring the real voice of the Ukrainian people would be heard. We commend UCC National for coordinating the community's response. To those who travelled to Ukraine to participate, to the many who assisted in the organization and fundraising efforts, and to everyone who quietly watched with prayerful wishes, the UCC-SPC Board salutes you! The final result was the most gratifying acknowledgement.

UCC-SPC continues to receive lottery funding from SaskCulture and, to that end, is most appreciative of the contributions and support of the staff and board of SaskCulture. Since lottery dollars play a significant role in the support of culture in Saskatchewan, everyone is reminded to continue to purchase lottery tickets!

During the fall of 2004, it became apparent that lottery funds for the forthcoming year would be reduced. In direct immediate response, the UCC-SPC Board approved the first ever UCC-SPC province-wide fundraising lottery. What started as a single item draw evolved into the 'Live Free for a Year' concept with some thirty-six prizes. The most exciting aspect of the lottery is that the majority of the net funds raised will go directly into the Saskatchewan Ukrainian community in support of cultural development.

In summary, it has again been a very consuming, sometimes difficult, yet most productive year for the Ukrainian community of Saskatchewan as is represented by UCC-SPC. As Chair of the Board, I extend sincere thanks to every member; your commitment is indeed enviable. To the Branch Presidents, thank you for being the backbone of the organization. To our staff for your continued contribution, we thank you on behalf of the entire community.

And finally, I encourage you to "Celebrate 100 Years of Heart" by partaking in the many festivities taking place in honour of our province's centenary.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

It Takes a Community...

One cannot help but be proud of the significant accomplishments achieved by Ukrainians in 2004. It was a year which saw the inauguration of western Canada's largest multicultural youth project—Youth Action Now—under the leadership of UCC-SPC, partnered with the

Multicultural Council of Saskatchewan, and funded by the Department of Canadian Heritage. We also witnessed history in the making as Ukrainians took to the streets in what has become known as the Orange Revolution to stand up for their freedom and step towards becoming a full-fledged member of the European community of democratic nations. Ukrainians in Saskatchewan and across Canada celebrated the personal success of Saskatoon's Theresa Sokyrka in her quest to become Canadian Idol. REPORT ON UCC-SPC ACTIVITIES FOR 2004

The Ukrainian Canadian Congress – Saskatchewan Provincial Council's continues to be guided by the broad theme 'Growing our Future: changing today to meet the needs of tomorron' set out in the spring of 2003. By reflecting and building upon our community's strengths and accomplishments we believe we are better able to ensure a dynamic and relevant future for Saskatchewan's Ukrainian community. Efforts aimed at support for Saskatchewan Ukrainian youth, cultural, heritage, educational and arts programming are the top priorities. In addition, UCC-SPC continued to provide effective representation for Saskatchewan Ukrainians before all levels of government and our society at large. With regards to Saskatchewan-Ukraine relations in 2004 UCC-SPC efforts aimed to expand opportunities for greater Ukrainian immigration to Saskatchewan while pressing the Government of Canada to strongly support democratic reforms and a free and open Presidential electoral process in Ukraine.

Through on-going public consultations, UCC-SPC is able to update and clarify its mandate and goals thereby ensuring they reflect the priorities of our community. It is with these goals and priorities in mind that projects and initiatives are undertaken.

Goals of the UCC-SPC

1. Develop and implement a vibrant external and internal communication system

The Ukrainian Canadian Congress - SPC has three main tools for communication with its membership and the general public. They are the Visnyk newsmagazine, the new e-Bulletin and the website (www.ucc.sk.ca).



In 2004, nearly 15,000 copies of the Visnyk newsmagazine were distributed to community members, partners and institutions across Saskatchewan and beyond. The popularity of Visnyk is evident as it remains a high priority for donors. Visnyk is one of UCC-SPC's major means of sharing our message with the community as it takes us into the homes and hands of a high percentage of the Ukrainian population of Saskatchewan. Through Visnyk, UCC-SPC is able to disseminate news and information regarding the activities of Saskatchewan Ukrainian groups and individuals.

In April, 2004 UCC-SPC launched the 'e-Bulletin', a biweekly electronic newsletter emailed to a growing number of email addresses. 'e-Bulletin' provides up-to-date

news and information on community issues, events and activities to its readers.

The UCC-SPC Website (www.ucc.sk.ca) has become another popular resource for the community averaging over 5,000 visitors and nearly 15,000 page views *monthly*. Our in-house capacity has allowed us to maintain and expand the site. Content of www.ucc.sk.ca is updated regularly, particularly on the 'What's New' and 'Events Calendar' pages. Contact information for the over 200 Ukrainian organized groups in the province is available along with access to a simple Resource Centre catalogue, electronic versions of recent issues of the Visnyk, the UCC-SPC Annual report for the previous year as well as a new Youth page.



In the summer of 2004, UCC-SPC received funding from the federal Human Resources and Development Department which allowed us to hire a summer student. Marko Baran expanded the website's Youth page which includes a message board. Future plans call for a Saskatchewan Ukrainian business directory, expanded UCC-SPC branch pages plus an on-line archive of the Saskatchewan Ukrainian community's history.

2. Engage in innovative programming

UCC-SPC offers innovative and diverse programming. The following is brief description of some of those.

Nation Builders Award luncheon

The tenth annual Nation Builders Awards luncheon was successfully hosted by the community of Yorkton and attended by over 220 guests. Ed Kucey served as Master of Ceremonies. Members of the Kalyna and Troyanda Ukrainian dance ensembles acted as honourary ushers. The 2004 honourees represent an impressive cross-section of activities and achievements. The newest Nation Builders are:

 Olga Andruschak (d) (Hafford), a community organizer who spent much of her life as a teacher and leader in women's and youth organizations plus the Ukrainian Arts Program of the UCC-SPC.



- **Dr. Fred Cenaiko (Wakaw),** a long-time physician from Wakaw who has supported the community generously, financially and professionally plus working with charitable organizations overseas.
- **John Chyzowski (d) (Saskatoon),** an educator by profession and community worker who over the years helped numerous parishes and projects like the St. Volodymyr Villa succeed.
- Bernie Federko (Foam Lake/St. Louis, USA), the NHL star from Foam Lake who brought fame and glory to the St Louis Blues.
- Ben Hladun (Prince Albert), an artist and architect whose art creations and architectural works are widely known, but especially in Saskatchewan.
- Rt. Hon. Ray Hnatyshyn (d) (Saskatoon/Ottawa), Canada's 24th Governor General and supporter of the arts and volunteerism and recognized internationally for his contribution to justice and liberty.
- **Dr. Ed Klopoushak (Regina),** University of Regina Professor Emeritus, acknowledged supporter of numerous Ukrainian institutions and charitable organizations and a tireless community worker.
- Morris Korpan (Saskatoon), an ardent supporter of a wide range of Ukrainian community and church organizations as well as provider of aid to Ukrainians in Ukraine.
- Iryna Lazurko (Canora), a teacher of Ukrainian language and culture and an organizer of cultural events plus a tireless supporter of community and church organizations.
- Molly Lenhardt (d) (Melville), the acclaimed artist who expressed a deep passion for her Ukrainian heritage and compassion for Ukrainian pioneer women through her paintings.

The Nation Builders Awards program was established by the UCC-SPC to recognize individuals who have provided outstanding service or exceptional community involvement in an area that is beyond the performance of the individual's normal duties or the exercise of the responsibilities of a profession to which that individual belongs, and/or who have made a lasting impact on Saskatchewan and/or Canada through their contribution to Canadian or Ukrainian-Canadian community development, goals and ideals.

UCC-SPC acknowledges the strong financial support of community organizations, businesses and individuals from within our province and across Canada. Sincere thanks are extended to members of the Yorkton organizing committee for a job well done and to the UCC-SPC Recognitions Committee, chaired by Dr Tony Harras, for their on-going contributions to maintaining the Nation Builders Awards as the distinguished event it has become. Particular thanks go to Angeline Chrusch of Saskatoon who will not be continuing as a member of the UCC-SPC Recognitions Committee. Saskatchewan Ukrainian Historical Society

In 2004, Mrs Karen Pidskalny was contracted to take on the coordination role for UCC-SPC's Saskatchewan Ukrainian Historical Society. Karen brought a zeal and creativity to SUHS and, over the course of the year, was able to organise two "In Baba's Trunk" conferences (May in Saskatoon; November in Regina) which were very well attended and received.

A Steering Committee made up of volunteers from across
Saskatchewan was established to assist in the Society's development
and fundraising applications made in support of a new project, a tour guide to Saskatchewan's Ukrainian
Historical sites. Work on this project will take place in 2005. For more information visit the Programming

Community Development Fund

UCC-SPC's CDF was developed to allow community groups and individuals the opportunity to share in SaskLotteries dollars in order carry out projects in support of Ukrainian cultural and other activities in Saskatchewan. Although modest the grants are often the catalyst for a remarkable amount of activity and for long-lasting results. CDF criteria have been kept wide so as to encourage groups to develop projects that meet their specific needs.

The CDF has been providing financial assistance to member groups, individuals and non-profit organizations since 1994 and in 2004 **21 grants** totalling more that \$8,250 were disbursed to assist Ukrainian community work from across the province. 3. Develop and implement an inspirational educational service

Established in 2002, the Saskatchewan Committee for Ukrainian Language and Education (SCULE) serves as UCC-SPC's standing committee on education issues (Sadochok/pre-school through University) permitting UCC-SPC to maintain its commitment to promote Ukrainian educations programs across the province. During the month of October, UCC-SPC presented each child enrolled in a Ukrainian Sadochok/Pre-School, Kindergarten or Grade 1 Ukrainian school program with a Ukrainian-language book. Over 120 copies of the books Коли я сам — Коли я сама were distributed with the assistance of Nadia Prokopchuk and the Social Sciences Unit of SaskLearning. Teachers organized events in their classes during Education Week at which the books were presented to the children and, where possible, a guest reader from the community was invited to read.

Through this initiative, UCC-SPC wishes to demonstrate its support for the many families who have chosen to enrol their children in primary Ukrainian classes while at the same time, encourage our children to grow their language skills through reading.

Another way in which UCC-SPC supports Ukrainian education is through the Community Development Fund where many of the province's Ukrainian summer camps and sadochoks can obtain financial support in the form of grants.





4. Revitalize the organization with 'Hot New Blood'



2004 was a good year for UCC-SPC in the area of immigration. The Board approved the establishment of a standing committee on Immigration under the leadership of Chair Evelyn Wojcichowsky. Together with committee members Ed Lysyk, Tony Harras, Yars Lozowchuk and Executive Director Danylo Puderak, the committee worked to develop a framework to support increased immigration to the province while maintaining a constructive dialogue with the Immigration Branch of the Government of Saskatchewan. UCC-SPC was able to provide assistance to Northern Steel as they undertook to bring a group of qualified welders

from Ukraine to Saskatchewan to meet their labour shortage in Tisdale. UCC-SPC looks forward to more such opportunities.

5. Introduce more diversified community involvement

In late 2003 UCC-SPC learned of its successful application to the Department of Canadian Heritage for a grant in support of a new youth initiative called Youth Action Now. YAN is sponsored by the Ukrainian Canadian Congress - Saskatchewan Provincial Council (UCC-SPC) and the Multicultural Council of Saskatchewan (MCoS).

In 2004, the Youth Action Now project came to life. In February 2004, project staff were hired and oriented to the project, and a 01 March Project Launch was hosted at Michael Riffel High School in Regina. Efforts then shifted to assembling a team of Youth Project Leaders and the Youth Advisory Committee. Early on the Advisory Committee (YAC) began shaping its role and activities. YAN staff undertook a selection process in order to establish a team of some 25 Project Leaders (YPL) who would participate in a Train-the-Trainer program where they would develop both facilitation skills and outlines for the youth forums that would be

conducted in the fall in communities across Saskatchewan. Attention was paid to ensuring the project leaders represented a cross-section of Saskatchewan's multicultural community.



YAN staff also contacted schools and multicultural groups from all over the province, setting up meetings, discussing the project, and developing relationships that would enable them to successfully hold the youth forums in the fall and winter.

The YAN project made an important impact on the project leaders. One of the Project Leaders had this to say: "When people from multicultural backgrounds work together the sum of the parts is far greater than the whole. Working as a Youth Leader taught me to see through the eyes of others, and helped me appreciate the value of our cultural diversity."

In the fall, Youth Action Now contracted Arcas Strategic Marketing Group to conduct the YAN Youth Survey, consisting of phone survey completed in September prior to the start of the youth forums plus a written component completed by participants at each of the provincial youth forums. The results of both the phone and written survey will be analyzed, compiled and released as part of the Blueprint for Action.

Youth Action Now's fall season of province-wide youth forums began in earnest in September. The first youth forum was held September 25th in Yorkton. After Yorkton, another 12 forums were held in the following communities: North Battleford, Unity, Meadow Lake, Fort Qu'Appelle, Saskatoon, Kindersley, Rosthern, Regina, Swift Current, Hudson Bay and La Ronge. The goal was to involve over 2,000 youth in YAN forum.

Each forum was quite unique, but common themes emerged from the youth participants which will form the basis of the project's final report, the YAN Blueprint for Action. The multicultural showcases that happened over forum lunch hours were appreciated by all and provided a high energy, interactive way for the youth participants to experience the variety of cultures existing in their home towns.

The groundwork had been laid and important milestones were achieved which set the direction built the momentum which would take the Youth Action Now project to its successful culmination in 2005. For further information, visit the YAN website at www.youthactionnow.ca.



6. Develop and implement a system for creative sharing and learning



To realize this goal, one only needs to look as far as the Youth Action Now project and the prominent role the Ukrainian community played in its implementation. Here was a federally-funded multicultural youth initiative which brought together Saskatchewan youth of a variety of cultural backgrounds, under the leadership of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress – SPC and whose focus was to bring the attention of our province's young people to building an inclusive, respectful multicultural future for Saskatchewan. The over two thousand youth involved would share their backgrounds and cultures while learning about the over 90 other cultures that call Saskatchewan home.

7. Facilitate development of assistance and exchange programs with Ukraine.


The world bore witness to a pivotal historical event in the winter of 2004 when Ukrainians by the millions stood up to authoritarianism and corruption in their homeland and caused the Orange Revolution to take place. The Ukrainian Canadian Congress – SPC strongly supported the efforts of the Ukrainian people to have their voices heard and break away from their anti-democratic past. In Saskatchewan, local communities organised fundraising events, protest marches, candle-light vigils, informational evenings, special prayer services, and petitioned government leaders to take a public stand in support of freedom and democracy in Ukraine. Saskatchewan people also heeded the call to go to Ukraine and serve as international election observers



with nearly 30 doing so for the three rounds of elections. In the end history was made and Ukrainians around the world celebrated. It could have been very different without the efforts and sacrifices of volunteers here in Saskatchewan joining in mind and body the protestors on Maidan to help ensure a brighter future for the people of Ukraine. For this we are grateful!

8. Develop a competent and active leadership

Being able to provide opportunities for our youth to develop their professional skills is a priority for UCC-SPC. In the summer of 2004, UCC-SPC received funding from the federal Human Resources and Development Department which allowed us to hire a summer student. Marko Baran worked at expanding the UCC-SPC Website's Youth page which now includes a message board. Visit www.ucc.sk.ca/youth/index.php.




9. Integrate the work of the UCC-SPC and its member organizations and groups

The UCC-SPC Annual General Meeting was held in May 2004 at the Dormition of the Holy Mother of God Ukrainian Catholic Church in Saskatoon in conjunction with the "In Baba's Trunk" conference and Vesna Festival. By doing so it provided an opportunity for members to gain a better understanding of the diversity



of UCC-SPC's membership/activities as well as actively participate in the annual meeting of the membership. As per the organisation's by-laws, elections to the UCC-SPC Board of Directors were also held. Eugene Krenosky was re-elected to another three-year term. Other members elected were: Ed Lysyk, Regina (Vice-President); Craig Zaychkowsky, Saskatoon (Treasurer); Merle Maximiuk, Yorkton (Secretary); Larry Balion, Saskatoon; Angie Huculak, Regina; and Evelyn Wojcichowsky, Saskatoon (Members-at-Large). Adrian Boyko remained Past-President with the Presidents of UCC-SPC's 7 branches completing the Board membership.



UCC-SPC Membership

UCC-SPC consists of organizational members. Members derive benefit by having access to the services provided by the office, the UCC-SPC databases, the Resource Centre and programs. As the UCC-SPC is only the sum of its parts, the relationship is mutually beneficial. UCC-SPC estimates that 13,600 members of Saskatchewan's over 121,000 Ukrainian Canadians participate in the organizations that are represented by the UCC-SPC. Tens of thousand of others participate through informal and less structured groups that encompass dance, education, culture, heritage, seniors clubs and church organizations or as members of the general public enjoying the benefits of the Ukrainian contribution to the developing Saskatchewan cultural scene.

Ukrainian Culture Captivates Kids

The fourth annual Battlefords Ukrainian cultural Day Camp was held July 26-30. The week was full of activities to teach and enjoy Ukrainian culture, and the week wrapped up with a 40-minute concert to showcase the children's learning.

Rhea Rathje and Laurie Kardynal-Bahri, both of whom are originally from the Battlefords, returned to facilitate the camp. The idea began as an experiment 4 years ago, and now neither wants to give it up. The kids just keep amazing us with their enthusiasm for Ukrainian culture," said Rathje.

Twenty-three kids aged 5-12 attended the camp. The facilitators reported that two-thirds of the day-campers were attending for a second, third, or fourth year.

The kids remembered the songs and dances from previous years. "They just spontaneously erupted into a song that we learned two years ago. I don't know how they remembered!" said Rathje.

Activities at the camp include singing, dancing, cooking, crafts, and language. The most popular craft this year was a rose bowl done in the colors of the flag of Ukraine. "People just think Ukrainian culture is dancing and Easter eggs and perogies, so we're trying to round that out, to educate the children about the language and culture and to strengthen the community in the Battlefords," said Rathje.

The camp focuses on a different theme each year. This year Kardynal-Bahri chose the theme of Vesna, of Spring, to showcase several ritual spring dances. "It is amazing to see what the kids can learn in one week," said Bahri.

After the children perform their songs and dances at the concert, everyone is invited to stay for a potluck supper. The crafts are on display and families mingle before saying good-bye until next year.

We have had a general meeting at which there was a lot of discussion about the 2005 centenary. A lot of ideas have come to the forefront which we hope to implement in 2005.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Directors of Ukrainian Canadian Congress - Saskatchewan Provincial Council

We have audited the balance sheet of Ukrainian Canadian Congress - Saskatchewan Provincial Council as at December 31, 2004 and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Council's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except, as explained in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In common with many non-profit organizations, the Council derives a portion of its revenue in the form of cash, the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of revenue was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Council and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenues, assets, or net assets.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which we might have determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of revenue referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Council as at December 31, 2004 and the results of operations and changes in financial position of the Council for the year then ended, in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 2004

1. Mission

The Saskatchewan Provincial Council is the provincial branch of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress. The Headquarters of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress is located in Winnipeg, Manitoba. The Saskatchewan Provincial Council provides cultural and educational programs and is dedicated to promoting the development of the Ukrainian community throughout Saskatchewan.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and include the following significant accounting policies:

Capital assets and amortization

Capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is calculated using the following annual rates and methods:

Furniture and fixtures

5% - straight line

Computer hardware

10% - straight line

Computer software

20% - straight line

In the year of acquisition, amortization is taken at one-half of the above rates.

Income Taxes

The Council is exempt from income taxes as it is a non-profit organization.

Revenue Recognition

The Council follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Endowment contributions are recognized as direct increases in net assets. Revenues from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund for Sport, Culture and Recreation are shown as deferred revenues if they relate to the next fiscal period and as grants receivable if they relate to the current fiscal period and are not received by the end of the current fiscal period.
